A Public Meeting was called for the Evening  
of ~~July 29<sup>a</sup>~~ <sup>July 29<sup>a</sup></sup> 1935 for the purpose of considering  
the advisability of having a Cemetery in Pemberton Meadows  
belonging to the Community as a whole.

W. C. Girling was elected to the Chair but as the attendance  
was very small, and as it was stated that many of those  
who were interested had not known of the meeting, it was  
decided to adjourn to a later date, steps being taken while  
talks to acquaint all residents.

The Adjourned meeting was held in the Boys Club House  
on the Evening of August 18<sup>th</sup> 1935, when the following

The Chairman (Mr. W.C. Kirking) addressed the meeting. He stated that the present circumstances were as follows: For several years spasmodic efforts had been made to secure a suitable site for a Cemetery and that various fee offerings of land had been made. After much care and consideration of the advantages of the various sites a small Committee appointed by the members of the Anglican Church had recommended the site offered on the property belonging to the Trustees of the late Mr. Sharp, and actually one burial was made there in 1934. However Mr. G.W. Downton B.C.L.S. came to survey the ground he found a discrepancy existed as to the boundary, and the members of the Anglican Church decided that the site must be abandoned. Then came an offer from Mess<sup>r</sup> Wilson Brothers to give one half of an acre on Lot No. and this was reluctantly accepted. Here have been laid the bodies of three old residents who have passed on this year.

Many people however, had expressed the opinion that the Cemetery should be the property of all rather than belong to any particular religious denomination, and the Anglican Church members were quite prepared to accede and he - the speaker - was empowered to offer the ground given by Mess<sup>r</sup> Wilson Brothers to the community provided Trustees were appointed and an undertaking given to lay out, beautify and preserve it as a Burial Ground.

Since the subject had been before the public Mr. D. Morrison had made an offer of land on his property, but it was felt that this offer could not be accepted seeing that three graves had already existed on Mess<sup>r</sup> Wilson Brothers' land.

The first question to be answered was whether it was desired that the Cemetery should be a Community one rather than one belonging exclusively to the Anglican Church. This question was put to the meeting and a unanimous vote in favour of it was passed.

After some discussion it was proposed by Mr. F. Decker and seconded by Mr. W.M. Miller that the meeting gratefully accepted the offer of the Anglican Church authorities to hand over the  $\frac{1}{2}$  acre donated by Mess<sup>r</sup> Wilson Bros. and on the proposition of Mr. C. Kirking seconded by Mr. John Roxburgh a vote of cordial thanks to Mess<sup>r</sup> Wilson was unanimously passed.

It was agreed that a letter should be sent to Mr. Morrison thanking him for his offer of land and explaining that as Messrs' Wilson & Bros' had been accepted there would be no necessity to call upon him.

Trustees.

In the question of the appointment of trustees it was voted that the property of the Cemetery general approval was given to the suggestion that they should be chosen from amongst the younger members of the community, and after discussion the three following were unanimously elected, viz:-

Mr Morgan Miller, Mr John Ronayne Jun. & Mr D. G. T. Wilson.

On the proposition of Mr Decker, seconded by Mr Taylor it was agreed to appoint a working Committee of 7 whose duty it would be to collect necessary funds, arrange the legal matters and grade, fence and otherwise prepare the site. The said Committee to act for one year or such shorter time as may be necessary. The following were appointed to serve on this Committee, viz:- Nels Fraser, W. Kilring, W. A. Miller, John Ronayne, A. Ross, R. H. Taylor and J. C. M. Wilson.

Power to spend. On the proposal by Mr Christopher Girling, seconded by Mr R. H. Taylor the working Committee were empowered to spend up to One hundred dollars (\$100) in connection with preliminary legal expenses, and for fencing levelling and beautifying the site.

It was decided that when the working Committee has completed its work they shall make a report of same to a general meeting called to receive it and to consider the appointment of a permanent body to control the Cemetery. It was an instruction to the working Committee that  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an acre only should be fenced in at present.

It was agreed that pending the appointment of a permanent Board the Trustees should act as a temporary Board of Management to deal with questions of burials, allotment of spaces etc etc.
